

Presidents' Update

With the lack of rowing this term, my Co-President, Harry, and I have had ample time to orchestrate some exciting developments for SHCBC. Taking inspiration from Green Templeton Boat Club, we have engaged in preliminary talks with both College and Mansfield College Boat Club (with whom we share our clubhouse) to plan a refurbishment of our Longbridges club room.

Once an infrequently-used space, the club room has received a substantial amount of use this year for various social and recruitment events. Due to this, we have deemed it worthwhile to invest in turning the boat house into a more comfortable and pleasant place that we are proud to show off. Budget depending, our plans are to resurface the kitchen space, repaint the walls, and replace some of the most ancient items of furniture.

In conjunction with this, the Long-

bridges Committee has decided that the racking in the VIIIs bay will be upgraded this year. This will consist of replacing all existing racks with sliding ones, and the amount of lengthwise support bars will be reduced from four to three. This will ultimately mean that the days of removing back stays in order to rack our boats will become a distant memory.

A fortunate consequence of the new racking is that another VIIIs rack may become available to SHCBC, opening up the possibility of us getting a fifth shell. With the steady yearon-year growth we have been seeing, even despite this year's lack of water training, there are plans to potentially leverage this extra space to purchase a shared M3/W3 shell - although is a scheme both temporally and fiscally in its infancy.

Finally, I would like to extend an invitation to all SHCBC alumnae to attend our annual Sirens Day event, which will be taking place on Saturday the 4th of May. The day will consist of an afternoon at the (hopefully renovated) boat house, wherein there will be the opportunity to row as well as to meet SHCBC members both past and present - all fuelled by snacks, Pimm's, and Prosecco. Then, in the evening, there will be a drinks reception at the St Hilda's Pavilion followed by a three-course dinner.

We will be sending out exact details very soon, so keep your eyes on your inboxes. We would also like to invite everyone to come down and watch Torpids in Hilary. This will take place from the 28th of February to the 2nd of March; W1 will be racing at 2:45 and M1 at 3:15, the lower boat times are yet to be confirmed.
